Good Things Start At The Pro Shop

## Fairway 1

The first hole at continental country club is a golfer friendly par five, giving a player an early opportunity for a birdie. Longer hitters will be able to get home in two with a mid to long iron, giving them a chance for an eagle. Players must be careful to not cut off much of the trees to the right on their t-shot, or their second shot will be blocked by a large oak tree. With a back pin placement players should avoid going over the green, which will leave a very difficult up and down. Two bunkers protect a front pin placement, but leave a relatively simple bunker shot.

### Pete Gettys

I always liked to start down the left with a little fade. To far right and you are blocked by trees.

### **Scott Weaver**

I love watching the young pros play this hole in The Wildwood Open. They know how to play it. Hit a faded 300 yard drive, then a sweet easy 170 yard 8 iron. Take 2 putts for simple birdie or knock their eagle putt in the hole. Easy Peasy, for them 🤔

### Robin Haulk Weber

I go right short cut

### **Mike Roberts**

Drive to the center to the right turn! (at least that is where I aim but the ball never cooperates- it must be the club!)



## Fairway 2

The second hole is a short dogleg left par 4. Long hitters may take a swing at the green but must carry the trees guarding the left side of the fairway leaving at most a short wedge into the green....however a pushed tree shot to the right will leave players a difficult to approach out of the trees. The conservative tee shot is 200 yards down the right center, avoiding the fairway bunker. A good tee shot affords another great opportunity for birdie.

### **Continental Championship Golf** ·

Beautiful hole. I have found it best to hit drive between the left turn in the fairway and the sand trap on right. Hit left and good chance of getting the 2nd shot coming back at you given the trees.

### **Bobby Ratterree**

Hole 2 is a short and appears an easy par 4, but the dog leg left, and sand trap right makes it change. After your drive, the second shot up to the green, false front, and a very deceptive look, hard and fast so difficult to get the ball to land and stick. Great par 4. Love this deceptive hole.

## Fairway 3

The first par three brings water into play for the first time on the course. Although right of the green, an aggressive shot at a right pin placement brings water into play. Players electing to play away from the water will bring the front bunker into play. Players going over the green will find a hazard only a few places off the back of the green. An approached shot to the middle of the green will leave a player a relatively flat putt for a birdie.

### **Phyllis Kidwell**

Hole in 1!!!

### **Larry Patton**

Seems to play a club longer.

### **Dan Huffman**

Agree don't go long. Right now with new green is a little firm.

### **Mike Roberts**

Trouble on the left, right and back.

### **Bobby Ratterree**

Simple par 3? Nope false front, grade running down the lake, bunker on the left, and a ditch on the back side. Get it high in the air, hit the front of the green and hope it doesn't roll off!

## Fairway 4

With trees running tight down the entire left side of this hole, players will be tempted to aim to the right bringing OB into play. A fairway wood or long iron may be your best shot off this tee. An approach shot past the front pin placement will leave players with the fast downhill or sidehill putt. A shot over the green with a back pin placement leaves the player with a very difficult up and down.

### Continental Championship Golf

Stay in the center of the fairway on this one !

### Scott Weaver

This hole can get a round heated up or deflated real quickly. Possible birdie hole or maybe double or triple after coming off the green. Choose wisely on the tee. This is a powerful 300 yard par 4 and can blow your round clean off your scorecard, you've got to ask yourself

### Brian Ewerdt

Out of bounds on the right (just three or four paces off the fairway) make the left side of the fairway, the place to play. However; tall trees make that tough for someone that plays a cut or fade. If you draw the ball; you're in luck. Not a particularly long hole so precision is key. Large green makes it important to get your yardage exact. Front part of the green you'll want to be below the hole. Center of green is always a safe bet since it's a fairly elevated green and many shots get tossed to the side. Should be an easy par but I'm guessing there are a lot of bogeys. Good luck!



## Fairway 5

This par 4, the most difficult on the front nine, brings water into play on the tee shot and for shorter hitters on the second shot. Players electing to lay up short of the pond on their tee shots will leave a second shot of 200 + yards onto the green. Players heading safely into the fairway left to the pond will have to negotiate a large tree guarding the front left side of the green ... push your shot right and you will catch one of the two greenside bunkers. A large slope on the green can mean difficult back pin placement on one of the deepest and narrowest greens on the course. With the back pin placement any approach shot left or long leaves a very difficult up and down. Par is a great score here.

### **BettyAnn Walker**

This is a very difficult hole. I'm not a golfer so how do I know it's difficult? I have found more than 200 golf balls on my lawn in the year and a half that I have lived across from Gator Pond and my house has been hit at least 30 times.

### **Jo Ellen Ivacko**

**BettyAnn Walker** Of course I totally understand where you're coming from , although it sounds like it's gotten worse in the last year and a half. Maybe the golfers have gotten worse???

### **Janet Blair**

No problem if you hit it long and straight, the green is another matter! I try to play from the fairway as I don't have a water shot in my bag.

### **Scott Groh**

One of my favorite holes especially when the pin is in the back;. If you play a high second shot you can go over the big tree on the left. It's also one of the toughest putting greens on the course.

### **Dan Huffman**

**Scott Groh** maybe you can go over the tree. We old guys have to go around it lol

### **Brian Ewerdt**

Driver brings water too much into play for me. I love the multi layer green, makes putting a challenging fun experience. Green is also a little more elevated than others. Bogey is honestly a decent score, just stay away from the double or triple. Over the green is OB quick!

### **Scott Weaver**

A hole to respect. The wind can be tricky on this dogleg as the trees can direct it in a way you can't feel. This hole can squash your momentum quickly. Choose your tee shot wisely; take the fairway route instead of going for distance. Then keep the ball below the hole especially when the flag is on the upper tier! A very stout golf hole!

### **Kim Walsh Vining**

Hardest hole on the course, try to aim to the left a little, just watch the tree.

### **Dan Penninga**

I can't hit a green from 80 yards but can hit the tree guarding the left front from 130 regularly.

### **Mike Roberts**

You better control your slice or Gator Pond will be trouble! Also a challenging multi-level green!

## Fairway 6

This dogleg left par 4 puts a premium on tee placement. Players hitting a long tee shot must draw their ball into a very narrow landing area. Players must avoid the left side trees or face in almost certain bogey or worse. A well placed tee shot down the right side will leave a mid to short iron into this green and will allow the player to avoid a large tree guarding the front left side of the green.

### **Kim Walsh Vining**

I have hit down the right and left side of this fairway! Somehow I can get myself out of the bad tee shot! It is a fair hole to play. I recommend to stay more to the right side then the left or you

### **George Russell**

Ditto

### **Scott Weaver**

Definitely a hole I want to birdie. I try to hit a high draw when the wind favors the shot and a low draw into the wind. From the senior tees I hope to have no more than 70 yards to the pin. If the pin is in the back section of the green I don't take it on, but aim for the middle of the green. If the pin is middle it is a green light hole to fire at the hole. If in the front I'll try to hit it just short of pin with height. I want a birdie but am never unhappy with a par. If I come off the hole with a bogey I not a happy golfer.

### **Dan Penninga**

Let's imagine you're oh say 130 out for your approach shot. And you're just hoping to get somewhere on the green. Ya gotta aim or at least hope to the right side. A secondary upside to this strategy is that if you go a little too far right you can have a conversation with the local parrot.

### **Scott Groh**

This is a fair hole. Play your tee shot down the right side for the best angle in. Bunkers on the left side of green are deep so stay out if you can.

## Fairway 7

This short par 5 is another great chance for a birdie and for longer hitters another opportunity for an eagle. Long hitters will need to either hit a draw off the tee or cut off the trees on the left side of the fairway to leave a long iron into this large green. Players choosing to cut the corner need to be sure not to go too far left or trees not visible from the tee will come into play. Shorter hitters need to play their tee shots down the right center to avoid the oak tree guarding the corner. A well placed second shot will leave a short iron into the green. Bunkers left and right guard the green and a shot hit over the green with a back pin placement leaves a very difficult up and down.

### **Robert Jacobson O'Connor**

Tee shot to the right of center. That will help avoid the tree guarding the left corner. Second shot stay in the middle so the third shot can avoid the bunkers on the left and right of the green. Don't go over on a back pin placement that makes up and down difficult.

### **Dan Huffman**

A really good short par 5. Gets longer each year. A good drive will hug left side of fairway.

### **Mike Roberts**

This is one of my favorite fairways. I try to hit my drive to the center/left of the fairway just beyond bend to the left. With a good drive and second shot, it is possible to be on the green and set up for a birdie or eagle putt if you are lucky!

## Fairway 8

This short par 3 is the easiest on the course and affords golfers a great birdie opportunity. The green is guarded by bunkers on both sides and golfers will have to avoid some overhanging tree limbs on the right side for their tee shots. Guard against going over the green with a back pin placement.

### **Dan Huffman**

I had my 3rd hole in one there and first at CCC

### **Pete Gettys**

This is Johnny Jones's Hole. He has had 8 holes in one here. That is at last count by me.

### **Dan Penninga**

Nice little golf hole. I recommend missing the green to the right to avoid having to walk across the fairway...and to keep your friends close and your beer closer.

### **Janet Blair**

I never have to worry about the bunkers (sand traps) as i'm usually left of one or right of the other. It is a great hole, does play long and you have to hit it straight. Wind is usually a factor. Long walk from cart path only to left of bunker. All in all a great golf hole that is tougher than it looks.

### **Brian Ewerdt**

Fairly simple straightforward par three. Always seems to play a little longer than the yardage (wind/elevation??) Center of the green is the best play because the bunkers are tough to get out of and hold the smaller green. Somewhat of a two-tiered sloping green so below the hole is always best. One of the most scenic greens on the course, so make sure to take in all the beauty around you. I hope you make a par here because the next hole is a tough par!

### **Scott Groh**

Straight forward hole plays about a half club longer than normal. The right bunker is easier to get out of than the left one.

### **Keith Walter**

#8 is my wife's favorite hole since she got a Hole In One there on her 71st birthday.

I got mine the year before, so it is our hole!

Hole seems to play longer than the yardage. Make sure you take enough club.

### **Mike Roberts**

#8 is a beautiful Par 3. No real hazards besides the bunkers on each side of the green!

## Fairway 9

The ideal tee shot for the closing hole on the front nine is down the right center, which will open the green up for the second shot. The fairway tilts left allowing tee shots down the right side to bounce back into play. The front left of the green is guarded by a large oak tree which will come into play for individuals hitting their tee shots down the left side of the fairway.

### **Scott Groh**

This is a good finishing hole. Stay left of the tree on your drive. This will give you the most level surface for your approach shot. Try to stay below the hole as there is a good back to front tilt on the green.

### **Richard Bruce**

**Scott Groh** I'm trying to think of a hole on this course that the green doesn't slope from back to front 😊

### **Robin Haulk Weber**

Go right.

## Fairway 10

A great 3-shot par 5. A tee shot pushed to the right will catch oak trees after the tee. a tee shot pulled left will catch the long fairway bunker. This uphill tee shot will leave all but the longest hitters with a blind second shot. Players may elect to play over the trees leaving a short wedge into the green or lay up to left of the trees leaving a longer third shot. Players electing to lay up to the left must be sure to avoid the pond lurking left of the fairway. If you have a blind second shot, you will want to split the fountain you see to the left, and the pine trees lining the right side of the fairway. Long hitters may want to try to fly the left Fairway bunker giving then a long “go at the green” ...but pull this tee shot to the left and you will be blocked out by trees. When playing your approach shot to a back pin location, be sure to avoid going over the green. For center or front pin an approach shot under the hole will leave a relatively straight uphill birdie putt.

### Paul Carlisle

One of my favorites, I prefer a drive up the left side, even ok into #18 fairway. Second shot should well inside the 150 and a birdie opportunity. A tough one with a front pin.

### Dan Huffman

Paul Carlisle yea but you are a long hitter lol.

### Mike Roberts

Paul Carlisle agreed Paul. It's one of my favorites also. It's also a beautiful view with the pond and fountain to the left as you approach the green.

### Scott Groh

Longest, hardest par 5 on the course. Tee shot down the left side is best. Watch out for the pine tree, at the point of dogleg, on second shot. Stay below the hole on approach.

### Larry Patton

Nicely designed par 5. Drive up the middle, then a soft fade fairway wood. Wedge below the hole and you're putting for birdie.

### Kent Van Hoe

Top contributor

If you can get past the trap on the left hit your drive over the trap or into #18 fairway and take the dogleg out of your 2nd shot. Don't go to far or you have the big tree to contend with.

### Dan Huffman

Very long Par 5 for most of us old guys. You can try to shortcut the hole if you favor the right side of fairway and can hit drive to top of hill. Otherwise you must play left of the two trees that guard the dogleg. Very tough hole for me. Green has a lot of slope back to front. If pin on front stay below the hole.

## Fairway 11

This hole is all about the tee shot. Any shot down the right side will require the player to either hit over the trees to reach the green or to punch a shot through the trees. The ideal tee shot is just right of the fairway bunker guarding the left side of the fairway. Long hitters should avoid hitting drivers which will go through the fairway and into the trees left. A slightly elevating green makes it difficult to determine the depth of the pin when coming in over the two bunkers guarding the front of the green. An approach shot landing on the right side of the green may bounce hard right off the green.

### Pete Gettys

A very tough hole. Must stay left to have an open shot to green.

### Mike Roberts

My slice from the tee box gets me in big trouble due to the trees on the right. Stay away from them at all costs!

### Frank Snyder

I consistently slice or push to the right and end up behind the tree line. In 6 years I have only gotten cleanly thru the trees once but was on the green and that has ruined me. 😊

### Scott Weaver

Very strong hole. My target off the tee is the Palm tree 240 yds away. You have to be aware of the prevailing wind to avoid drifting in the trees and bushes on right. Dont miss the green short, right, long or left 😊. In other word your approach better be precise or your short game better be

### Dan Penninga

It starts out all friendly with the cute water shed. And ya think I'll just hit a little cut around the trees. Well if ya don't get way past the corner the trees on the right will block your approach. The raised green is hard to hold and the bunkers covering the left front require an accurate

### Scott Groh

Try to get you tee shot down the left side. Don't miss the green long or left. Well designed hole

### Dan Huffman

Green is one of the hardest to hit even if you hit a good drive. Left protected by bunkers and green slopes more severely to right than it looks. Very difficult hole.

### Sheri Reynolds Rigdon

**Dan Huffman** visited that left bunker many times 😊 hard hole

### Richard Bruce

You would have to hit a really long fade to get any chance of a clean second shot. If you can hit left center of the green with back spin you might have a chance at birdie. Greens are hard though

### Dan Huffman

**Richard Bruce** They are getting better receiving the ball with each aerification. They putt very

### Richard Bruce

**Dan Huffman** coming down next week and find out 😊

## Fairway 12

This is the shortest par 4 on the course and is a classic risk reward hole. Long hitters may elect to go for the green on their tee shot...but any shot pulled left will find the water. Hang your tee shot too far to the right and you will catch one of the larger oak trees lining the right side of the entire hole. The safe shot is 180 - 200 yards off the tee leaving a short approach shot into this large green.

### [Sheri Reynolds Rigdon](#)

This is my favorite hole, i used to call it the bowling alley hole straight and narrow 

### [Dan Huffman](#)

The green really makes this hole. Slopes L to R with a bunker guarding the left side. I think one of the toughest holes on course.

### [Pete Gettys](#)

[Dan Huffman](#) what happened to the cart path?

### [Suzanne Mann](#)

[Pete Gettys](#) what their showing is just walk path going up to tee box.

### [Dan Huffman](#)

[Pete Gettys](#) they removed all except just before the green and continues to 12 tees.

### [Robin Haulk Weber](#)

I'm glad the palm  trees are gone.

### [George Munro](#)

The tee shot is everything, I prefer the center.

### [Scott Groh](#)

This hole definitely requires a good tee shot. The left side of the fairway is where you want to be. a short but often difficult hole.

### [Larry Patton](#)

The tee shot requires some thought. Depending on your game it's a mid-iron to hybrid off the tee and a wedge to short iron to the green. A short but challenging part four.

### [Mike Roberts](#)

A good drive to the left and you are in the water, to the right and you are in the trees. Choose your club wisely for your tee shot.

### [Scott Weaver](#)

I love watching the pros launch their tee shots on this hole during The Wildwood Open. I usually play position with a 5 iron leaving me anywhere from a wedge to a 9 iron depending on hole position. A definite risk/reward hole! Pull a driver out but dont pull it or the ball sleeps with the gators.

## Fairway 13

This is the longest par 3 on the course with bunkers guarding the left and right side of the green. The narrow green puts a premium on accuracy and par is a great score on this hole.

### **Dave Hutson**

Dave just hit a hole in one on June 6, 2023 on this 13<sup>th</sup> hole

Use the right iron and hit it straight. Too bad they don't have instant replay, I would have liked to see the ball go into the hole.

### **Pete Gettys**

It's all you want for a par 3.

### **Suzanne Mann**

Got my first hole in one on #13!

### **Pete Gettys**

**Suzanne Mann** I didn't know that. Congratulations

### **Suzanne Mann**

**Pete Gettys** thanks! 142 yards, as pin was in the back of green.

Unique tee location if you play the white or blue tees !

**Continental Championship Golf** I remember when the ladies tee was where the white tee box is now!

Many years ago (during pro am event) one of our ladies got a hole in one and won a car!!

### **Dave Hutson**

My favorite hole. I got a hole in one using a 5 iron at 138 yards. Wish the course had instant replay. lol

### **Robert Blair**

I've hit those wires more times that I've ever wanted from both blue and white. It is a great hole though but never easy.

### **Sandi Reynolds**

One of my favorite holes

### **Dan Huffman**

Good par 3. Plays a little longer than yardage. Can be a 2 club difference depending on tee and hole.

### **Keith Walter**

The green always plays slower downhill than you would think.

### **Scott Weaver**

Solid short Par 3. You must be aware of the wind by following the US Flags behind the green. Can play from 2 to 4 clubs different from day to day according to pin placement on the elongated green. I was fortunate to get my 5th overall hole-in-one last May with a 9 iron from 128 yards out.

### **Mary Wooley**

We live very near this and it's AMAZING how often we hear balls hit the power lines. The sound it makes is distinctive and sort of fun!

## Fairway 14

This hole is not only the longest hole on the course, but it is also the most difficult par 5 on the golf course. A player's tee shot needs to be extremely accurate to avoid trees and bunkers down the left side of the hole and trees and OB tight on the right side. Most players will not be getting home in two on this hole and will only be able to do so if they're tee shot hugs the right side of the fairway. The lay-up shot on this hole must stay to the right to avoid a large magnolia tree guarding the turn on the left. An approach shot over or right of the green leaves a difficult up and down.

- **Pete Gettys**

This was one of my favorite holes. Out of bounds to the right and trees to the left. You had to hit

**Scott Weaver**

A hole that the wind defends! If it's into the wind I keep it low off the tee and plan for 3 shots. If I have the wind behind me I tee it high and let it fly hoping to get it home in two. But those trees 🤔. Keep it center cut or you may walk off the green extremely frustrated

**Scott Groh**

Right side of fairway is the best angle to come in from but look out for O.B. further right. Reachable par 5 with 2 good shots.

**Dan Huffman**

**Scott Groh** for you young dudes maybe.

**Dan Huffman**

Good par 5 for us older guys playing forward tees. Still takes 3 good shots for possible birdie. Out of bounds is close on the right.

**Robert Blair**

Nightmare for us slicers so try to hit it down left. Then the dreaded straight shot into the trees. At least not the very sever two shot penalty if it goes right. I agree the shot to the green is better from right center of fairway. Left side is mostly cart path as people drive all over that side. Maybe restrict carts further left and allow grass to grow. All in all I like this hole as it provides a real challenge and course management to play it well.

**Richard Bruce**

If you're lucky, the ball will roll down the roof into the eave trough down the down spout and back onto the fairway 🙏🙏

## Fairway 15

Another short par 4 affording players a great opportunity for birdie. The ideal tee shot is just left of the pine tree in the center of the fairway. Long hitters can hit it over the pine, leaving a very short approach shot into this small green. Be careful cutting too much off the right side or you will wind up in the trees.

### **Mike Roberts**

This is a beautiful hole.

If you are a big hitter, it is possible to drive the green. One of my favorite holes!

### **Suzanne Mann**

One of my favorites!

### **Dan Huffman**

Favorite driving hole. Depending on pin location as to take shortcut right of tree or the safer shot left of pine tree. A really good short par 4.

### **Scott Weaver**

Drivable par 4! The wind determines my strategy though. If hard wind against I lay it up and depend on wedge game to get it up and down. If with wind I'm going for green.

### **George Munro**

Another hole drive is key, depending on pin placement.

### **Scott Groh**

Risk/reward hole. It's drivable but don't miss the green left, right, or long. This is a fun hole and I always go for it.

### **Robert Blair**

I've played with guys who have driven this green and it's a goal of mine. Come close but no cigar! Leave it short below the pin on approach. Love the tree that you have to go over or round makes for a great hole.

## Fairway 16

This par 4 is the second longest on the course and affords very little roll on the tee shot making the hole play even longer. A tee shot down the left side of this dogleg left will shorten the approach shot but players must be sure to avoid the bunker guarding the left side of the fairway. With one of the largest greens on the course, golfers may face a very long putt for birdie and a putt across the green will force the players to contend with a ridge that divides the front and back of the green. Par is a great score on this hole.

### **Dan Huffman**

Hardest Par 4 on golf course. It is the longest Par 4 from gold tees plus fairway is soft so no roll. Green has more slope than it looks. Just a hard hole.

### **Scott Groh**

A long par 4 that usually plays into the wind. Keep your drive down the left side of the fairway. You'll still have a long second shot. Par is a great score on this hole.

### **Scott Weaver**

A solid tough hole. It plays longer than you think because it's slightly uphill. Also the fairway is very soft so you don't get much runout off the tee. If it is into the wind your short game will probably have to save you.

### **Robert Jacobson O'Connor**

If you wind up on the right side with you tee shot you will have to contend with a tree on the right edge that overhangs the fairway for your approach.

### **George Munro**

A very difficult hole, tree trouble on right side and sand and water on left side. The longest part 4 on course from the gold tees with soft fairway. Good luck.

## Fairway 17

This par 3 is our signature hole at Continental Country Club. Although the yardages from the white and red tees are relatively short, a very deep narrow green is guarded in the front by water and on the right side by a bunker and water. Miss the green to the left and you are left with a very difficult chip shot to a slightly elevated green that runs away from you toward the water. A large slope running through the green breaks the green into two distinct levels putting a premium on heading your tee shot into the correct level. Move back to the blue tees against the wind and you now have an intimidating par 3, a three on this hole is a great score.

- **Paul Carlisle**

It plays tougher than it looks. Shoot for the middle of the green and you should make a par. Miss this green and you're on your way to a double...tell me I'm wrong!

**Kim Walsh Vining**

I have a love/hate relationship with this hole. If you pull your ball, you will wind up in the valley of death. If you tend to hit more to right, you can wind up in water, or even if you hit green on right, it will roll off into rough. Pin placement is a big deal for me on this hole.

**Scott Groh**

Kim Walsh Vining we feel your pain. LOL

**Scott Groh**

A beautiful par 3 that is always challenging. Aim for the middle of the green as anything on the left side will end up off the green.

**Dan Huffman**

My favorite Par 3. Very picturesque and tough pin placements makes putting a challenge. Also the hole where I made my 4th hole in and my most recent.

**George Munro**

A short hole you can make a big number on. Very picturesque. Lots of water and a tough green to put on some pin placements. Have fun.

**Larry Patton**

Just a beautiful par 3. Always add at least a half club. Far better to be deep on the green than deep in the pond.

**Mike Roberts**

Signature hole with water in front and the big pond fountain in the background. Beautiful par 3.

**Scott Weaver**

Best Par 3 on the course and the signature hole. The hole cut in the back top corner of the green is a great challenge. I love this hole as much as I hate this hole 😊

## Fairway 18

The strong finishing hole plays as a par 4 for men and a par 5 for the ladies. Long hitters will have a blind tee shot over the hill and must split the fairway to avoid interference from the trees on the left and right on their second shot. An uphill tee shot and elevating green will leave most golfers with a long iron or fairway wood approach shot that must avoid the bunkers guarding the left and right side of the green in front. A left back pin Placement will force golfers to face a very large break on most putts. Par is a great score on this strong finishing hole.

### **Scott Groh**

This is a good driving hole. If you go left watch out for the palms to block your shot. An elevated approach shot makes it tough. Par is a good score on 18.

### **George Munro**

Keep both 1st and 2nd shots straight and you're good, go of line and your in trouble, a good finishing hole

### **Dan Huffman**

A very tough 2nd shot with bunkers on right and left and a narrow approach. Very tough with front pin. A really good hole.

### **Mike Roberts**

Nice, straightforward fairway until you approach the bunkers around the green!

### **Continental Championship Golf**

Nice hole. Keep the ball in the center of the fairway and out of the bunkers surrounding the green. Easy Peezy (for some LOL)

### **Scott Weaver**

Great finishing hole. Plenty of fairway to hit, but the trees down the left side seem to be golf ball magnet. Bunkers on both sides of green catch a lot of approach shot and the green is plenty big enough to accomodate 3 putts.
